The Overture was played on an evening that had begun with a performance of our award winning Jekyll and Hyde Rock Eisteddfod item by students from Years 9 to 12.

During the course of Presentation Night, we heard of the wonderful accomplishments of our sporting and debating teams as well; 2011 being our strongest year to date.

At the end of the year, Sharlene Prasad, one of our graduates from the Class of 2011, was awarded the Young Citizen of the Year for the Brimbank area. Sharlene was a hard working student throughout her time at the College and heavily involved in the community service area.

Clearly, 2011 was a year of great achievements in the co-curricular and leadership arenas; these accomplishments highlighting the ever expanding and strengthening nature of this aspect of an Overnewton education.


Mr Victor Peplow



INCOME

The two major sources of income for the year for Overnewton Anglican Community College were tuition fees of \$16.9m and government funding of \$15.2m which combined, contributed 95.6% of the College's income.

EXPENDITURE

Total expenditure in 2011 was \$38.2m, and was comprised of employment costs of \$22.5m, or 58.9% of total expenditure, investment in capital works of \$6.8m, representing 17.8% of total expenditure and education and general costs of \$6.3m or 16.4% of total expenditure. Other costs for the year included financing costs of \$1.3m, being 3.5% of total expenditure and property and maintenance costs of \$1.3m, which was 3.4% of total expenditure.

Co-curricular Connections at Keilor Campus.

Throughout 2011, there were a huge range of events in which our students participated.

In Senior School, the 2011 House Performance was one of the best we have had. It had some real cleverness beyond the mere use of the talented students in years 10 to 12. The short history of House Performance has seen performances develop from the early years of some modest performances laced with cameo highlights by the talented few, to a highly coordinated House team production in which the very skilled and the complete novice could stand side by side and entertain. There are many students who may never have done performing arts like this before and this opportunity may just be that X-factor they needed for their own self esteem.

The College musical, *Once on this Island*, was really an event not to be missed. It was exceptionally well chosen and well cast. This production was sophisticated and challenged the emotions, as well as being truly entertaining. The cast included students ranging from Years 2 to 12 with a fabulous mix of singers and dancers. Kaylah Attard was outstanding, as were fellow leads Samuel Di Natale, Katherine Kropf, Daniel Hernandez, Saskia Johnson, Miranda Phaedonas, Sian Hughes, Ashley Apap, Jonathon Reeves, Mikaela Farrugia, Stefanie White, Beth Turner-Summerton and the amazing Chanel Scalise of Year 2, with a great cameo performance in Act II by Campbell Bonello. The supporting cast were clearly highly skilled and well-rehearsed.

The Year 5/6 Musical, *A Night at the Performing Arts Museum*, was a production of great colour and light, wonderful song and dance routines and many musical favourites for the older audience. Some fabulous talent was on display and we clearly have a raft of great performers moving through the student ranks. Year 6 teacher, Aaron Booker, wrote, directed and produced this uplifting show.

Senior School English teacher Drew Mason developed the concept of Shakespeare Shorts for our Senior School students in which to perform. It included scenes from Shakespearean plays that are part of our current curriculum at Years 9 to 12, including *Romeo and Juliet*, *Othello*, *Macbeth*, *The Merchant of Venice* and *Hamlet*. Senior School students spent several weeks preparing for

the production and each of them performed several roles, which was a challenging task that they managed very well. It was an enjoyable event, which included a number of students who had not previously participated on stage in performing arts productions.

For many years, Overnewton has been synonymous with high quality JRock and Rock Eisteddfod teams and the 2011 performances were simply superb, with great choreography, costumes, staging and, most importantly, outstanding teamwork. Overnewton's performance achieved a third place in the Premier Division which was particularly impressive, in a very closely contested competition. Both JRock and the revamped version of our Senior Rock Eisteddfod team '*Make Connections*' between students from both campuses.

In music, the College String Orchestra was awarded 3rd place for its performance at the prestigious Royal South Street Eisteddfod. This is the best result for this ensemble since they have been entering the Royal South Street Competition. There have been a number of examples of music ensembles showing improvements that are measurable against their counterparts from other schools.



The same is true in sport. We had over thirty teams make grand finals in sport during 2011, which is a record for the College. It culminated with eight of thirteen Year 7 and 8 teams winning premierships in the ACS Summer season; this is more than any other school in the competition. These teams all consist of a mixture of Keilor and Taylors Lakes Campus students which provides an important connection for them prior to them coming together in the classroom at Year 9. The College Athletics Team has also improved spectacularly from seventh position in every ACS carnival until 2009, to fourth place last year and third this year. This is the result of a detailed training program that students want to attend and great attention to detail by the Team Managers, Nikki Little and Carolyn Sadler. The team captains, Tayla Raniolo and Greg Georgiadis, led by example and their encouragement of fellow students was excellent.

and their team managers. The Year 5 and 6 students have had a great year in sports also with many students going on to competing at a district and state level.

Canowindra continues to engage our Year 9 students with a rigorous academic program complemented by the activity and elective offerings. Each year's cohort brings with it a unique character that embraces all of the opportunities presented to them differently from the previous year's group. The various electives and activities, in addition to the Focus Weeks and core program at Canowindra, allowed the students to experience success across a range of levels in a variety of settings, equipping them with skills not only relevant for Senior School but the world beyond school. Our Year 9 students also had a successful year in ACS sport, winning a number of summer and winter grand finals in a variety of sports, as well as contributing to the overall College success in the major carnivals.

2011 has been another very successful year for our students from a performing arts perspective. This year for the first time, Rock Eisteddfod was a combined Year 9 and Senior School activity. The enthusiasm of the Year 9 students coupled with the experience and leadership of the Senior School students ensured that *The Curious Case of...* was a spectacular performance, winning them third place in the Victorian Premiere Division of the Rock Eisteddfod Challenge. This was an excellent achievement for our students and the staff and parents involved. The Year 5 and 6 students also did well in Junior Rock Eisteddfod. Their performance of *The Fabulous Mr. Dahl* was just brilliant and won them numerous awards.

The College Musical, *Once on this Island*, provided students from Years 7 to 12 with the opportunity to put their singing, dancing and acting skills on show for the entire community. The touching story certainly highlighted the talents of all of the students involved and provided the audience with a wonderful evening of entertainment.

The Year 5 and 6 Musical, *A Night at the Performing Arts Museum*, was a wonderfully entertaining performance by the Year 5 and 6 students involved. It was clearly obvious to everyone in the audience that the students were having a great time performing this musical and their level of talent was fantastic. It was a great experience for everyone.

The theme for the 2011 school year, "*Making Connections*", clearly describes Overnewton. In 2011, all 161 of our students successfully completed their VCE. The final VCE results are a key indicator of success; however, they are by no means the only indicator, as each student has enjoyed success in a broad array of sporting, artistic and performing arts related fields in their time at Overnewton. Our results are particularly pleasing when we consider that Overnewton encourages all students to complete the VCE regardless of their academic ability.

Over 98% of our students received first round offers at tertiary institutions in 2011.

Our Dux for 2011 was Michael Weston with an ATAR of 98.20


A number of highlights associated with the final results this year include:

- 57% of students attained an ATAR above seventy, placing them in the top 30 percent of the state
- 40% of students received an ATAR above eighty, placing them in the top 20 percent of the state
- 11% of students received an ATAR above ninety, placing them in the top 10 percent of the state
- 61 individual study scores over 40 were received, placing these students in the top nine percent of the state in a given subject
- A perfect study score (50) was obtained in Health and Human Development.
- 21% percent of all examination results were either A or A+

The 2011 academic year finished superbly for our VCE students once again and with the College attaining a position within the top 25% of schools across the State.



During 2011, teachers continued to focus on the upcoming Australian Curriculum while consolidating their learning about and use of restorative practices. On average, staff undertook 17 hours of professional development, with teaching staff averaging over 36 hours for the year.

In addition to staff members attending externally presented learning sessions, regular meetings, guest speakers and information sharing sessions were held at the College for teams of teaching staff with their School-based colleagues. By the end of 2011, 14 Education Support Staff with administrative roles were engaged in business studies at either Certificate 4 or Diploma level.

■ Average expenditure for 2011 on professional development was \$745 per staff member.

■ 35% of teachers have postgraduate qualifications beyond what is required to gain registration with the Victorian Institute of Teaching. Areas where a number of teachers have extra qualifications include curriculum, special education, student welfare and information management.

■ 18% of teachers have degrees at Masters level or higher; many of these degrees are in various aspects of curricular or educational leadership, special education and student welfare.

■ The staff retention rate for 2011 was 94.4%, whilst the attendance rate was 95.2%.






Percentage of Year 3 Students Achieving Above Minimum National Standards 2008 – 2011




