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THE MATTER OF MANNERS

The text of a conversation between Scottish author Alexander McCall-Smith and Jennifer Byrne on ABC TV *First Tuesday Book Club* (First aired 11/10/2011.)

Manners are the small things - the small building blocks for a general attitude of respect and consideration for other people. So if you don't teach children these rather formal automatic manners, then I think it may be more difficult for them to grasp the bigger issues later on - the bigger issues about respect for others. And I remember as we all do when bringing up children, right at the beginning you sound like a long-playing record going on. 'What do you say? What's the magic word? Where's the thank you?' That sort of thing. We have to do that. And it's a form of fundamental socialisation. The problem seems to me that a lot of that has been somewhat pushed to the side because of pressure on parents, perhaps.

They've got less time. Everybody has to work harder, and therefore they have less time. The fact that people aren't having meals with their children - that's a rather disappointing development that if you look at the figures for the number of families that ever eat together, in a formal way, it's rather sad.....eating with the other person is a very fundamental form of social communication.

It's recognition of the humanity of the other. It's a fundamental social ritual which we're allowing to be eroded by the pressures of modern life. Is that making us lonelier as people? I suspect it is. I suspect we're becoming far more isolated and we sit there with our computers and iPhones, our electronic gizmos and we're losing the ability to talk to people. Look at what's happening to conversation. How many good conversations do you get on an aeroplane these days?

One of the four College values is respect. Good manners are an important ingredient of a respectful school environment and I am always delighted when I have members of the public or visitors to the College commenting favourably on the manners shown to them by students. Collectively, we need to make the time to have good conversations with each other to role model manners and enable respect to develop.

A MESSAGE FOR YOUNG DRIVERS

At the One Year Reunion on Friday, one of our College Board members, Don Hilton, addressed over one hundred of our Class of 2010 students about the need for safe driving. It wasn't the reason he was speaking to them, as he was ostensibly presenting prizes for the Old Collegians football tipping competition and talking about the virtues of maintaining contact with the Old Collegians. However, it was compelling to think about the recent tragedies on Victorian roads and the loss of young lives and here was a group of first year drivers before him.

This is a very timely discussion to have with your sons and daughters who are P platers or learners. The summer holidays lie before us, and parties, fun times and relaxation may include car trips in convivial circumstances. Calmness and concentration is essential and a wise head is needed behind the wheel. We all know that wisdom comes with experience that young drivers do not yet have and sometimes a taxi or an offer to drive them is a good solution.

I recommend that all parents of young drivers take a suitable opportunity to chat about care on the road as we enter the summer break.

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JUNIOR SCHOOL-KEILOR CAMPUS

This term, stories have played a major part in the inquiry units of many year levels.

Stories are a series of events which can be true or untrue.

Stories include: myths, legends, fairy-tales and fables, which all originated in the oral form. However stories also include theatre, film and written fiction and non fiction. Stories encompass our own personal anecdotes, descriptions, the news and, more difficult to grasp as an idea, the story in which we live.

As educators of young children we enjoy colourful oral stories daily! Before students can craft a piece of writing, they need to know both the content and the structure. Making and telling stories requires students to organise information into a cohesive and coherent 'whole' in order to communicate to other people, and develops the ability to sustain a monologue. It is through stories that these understandings are developed.

Stories are also a reflection of cultural values and perceptions. Traditional fables and parables shape our values. Stories about our national, cultural, or family history shape our attitudes about ourselves and others.

Making and telling a story gives the students an opportunity to reflect on their own concerns, perceptions and values. Listening to the stories of other students presents an opportunity to reflect on the perceptions of others and to respond to those reflections.

Finally, in the Overnewton context, stories are a spiritual vehicle for connecting us to other people and to God.

In the past fortnight, three year levels have had the opportunity to have an Incursion experience relate to story-telling.

The Preps enjoyed a performance of Beauty and the Beast, the Year 1s watched a 'Fairy-tale Fiasco' and the Year 3s came to understand what happens when Fairy-tales become fractured.

The Year 3s were discussing 'sizzling' starts for their stories about Remembrance Day last week and Ryan Griffiths in 3S

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wrote the following piece:

I am crouched in my trench with my gun by my side. My best friend died minutes earlier. There is anger running through me. I scramble out of my trench and begin shooting wildly. As I run through Flanders Fields, I see my best friend's body lying breathlessly on the ground. A cold feeling runs through my body, but that feeling only makes me madder.

I shoot even harder. With a flash of light, a bomb explodes metres away from me. I get blown back from the force. Shrapnel lands on my face. I scream in agony. Everywhere I look is red with blood. I panic when a body lands on top of me. I cannot move and I am too afraid to move. I shout with fear "Can somebody help me!" Will I ever make it home?

It is most rewarding for us all when we read such colourful pieces of work. As we head into the last weeks of the 2011 school year, the students continue to be engaged in purposeful, educational experiences that will stand them in good stead for their move to their new level next year.

RENEWING YOUR WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECK

Working with Children (WWC) Checks are valid for five years, unless revoked due to a relevant change in your circumstances. You need to renew if you intend to continue doing child-related work after your card expires. It is an offence to continue child-related work without a valid WWC Check card or receipt.

RENEWAL APPLICATION FORM

A renewal application form will be sent 8 weeks prior to the expiry date of your WWC Check card, to the last postal address you provided. When you receive your renewal application form, please check that all the details printed on your form are accurate and up-to-date as you will not be able to make any changes to the printed form. If any of the details on the form are incorrect or incomplete you must update your details and an amended form to you. Alternatively, you can complete a new application and submit documents to satisfy the 100 points of required identification, along with a passport size photo.

If you have not received a renewal application form, it may be because the Department of Justice do not have your current postal address. To update your address go to Online Change of Details or call the WWC Check Information Line. Once updated, a renewal application form will be posted to you.

LODGING A RENEWAL APPLICATION FORM

When all details on the form are correct, take the form together with your current WWC Check card to a participating Australia Post Outlet (APO) to lodge your renewal. Only your WWC Check card will be accepted by an APO as proof of identity. You need to check that the photo and/or signature are not damaged, so that the photo remains a reasonable likeness and your signature appears clearly on the card. If this is not the case, you will need to obtain a replacement card by calling the Information Line.

Please lodge your renewal application form soon after you receive it, to renew your card before it expires.
